I BOMBED

I got a text from a friend back in August asking if I would do a puppet show for Unity in the Community. It's a two day event put on by the churches in Etna. There's a main stage where preachers speak and bands perform. They usually try to bring in a big name evangelist. My friend is a Lutheran pastor as am I, and this is not the brand of Christianity we are used to, but he's trying to have a presence in the community. I agreed to help him out. I was scheduled to perform on Saturday, October 8, in the afternoon. I told him that my show was enjoyed by adults and children alike. I would need an electrical outlet.

He didn't get back to me with any other details, but I showed up at the appointed time and place. It was outdoors at the ball field in Etna. My assumption had been that I would perform on (or in front of) the main stage. When he greeted me at the ball field, however, I was led to the children's area between the bouncy house and football throw. The arts and craft table was about 15 feet away and the main stage was about thirty feet away. These activities were not going to stop while I was performing.

I started my show with a about 15 kids seated politely in front of me. I did the skits that I always do and seem to work well. I could tell right away that I didn't have the undivided attention of the audience. One by one or in small groups, they drifted away as I kept performing. I was cutting the show short and losing my concentration. I was practically yelling into the microphone in order to heard over the main stage. As I finished what had become my last skit, there were three kids left. They were older and just being polite. I had utterly bombed.

I've been performing for 39 years, and I haven't so spectacularly failed at a show since I was fourteen years old. My friend was angry at the event's planning committee. I was a little embarrassed and not a little angry for all the trouble I went through just to get hoarse from yelling. I took a breath and told him that I've been doing this a long time. I told him that this was just another show and my self worth as a puppeteer did not depend on my performance for this one show.

As I drove away, I thought about what I had learned from the experience. I needed to be clear about the type of show that I was presenting and what was needed from the audience. I needed to have the assertiveness to ask for what was needed for a successful show when I showed up at the venue. Better yet, I should have made it clear from the beginning.

Beyond all of the "should haves" running through my brain, I thought what could I have done differently when I showed up and saw the situation? What could I have at the ready to perform in such chaotic circumstances? I have been at fairs and outdoor events before with similar results. I decided that I needed some very brief skits that would work for very small audiences as I walked around with a puppet or two. In this way I could engage the crowd not all at once but just two to four people at a time. Instead of feeling angry about the circumstance or guilty for not putting on a good show, I became excited about the possibility for new material.

We will all have shows that go well and shows that bomb. Take some time after each show, the good ones and the bad ones, to evaluate what went well and what didn't. You may require some tweaking here and there. You may also discover whole new ways of engaging with an audience. After 39 years, I'm still learning. I hope you are too.


MEMBER NEWS The Rumba Report

Formed in June of 2015, Light Bright Beautiful Puppetry is a collaboration between seasoned artist-educators Alison Babusci and Alison Zapata. LBBP creates playful, arts-based learning experiences and interdisciplinary performances to teach and uplift diverse audiences in our community.

In our first year we have focused primarily on shadow puppetry and making connections with the arts and sciences for young learners. We are proud to report that after securing our first grant through Remake Learning and The Sprout Fund, LBBP just completed a successful series of residencies at Allegheny County Libraries.
